*****Mississippi Ink Tattoo Studio*****



On the far back side of the Buffalo Activity Center (City Hall), in a room originally used for teaching art to elementary kids (also most recently used as the Milestone senior meal site), long time Buffalo resident and full-time tattoo artist Jessica LaGrange has been developing a hot spot of creativity and self-expression now

> known as Mississippi Ink Tattoo Studio.



In less than four months since opening on June 5th, Jessica has already completed over 450 tattoos at the studio, adding almost daily to the several thousand she has done since 2015. Word of mouth from satisfied customers, many of whom have come

back repeatedly, has kept Jessica even busier than she expected with almost no advertising. Every customer is encouraged to leave their mark on the old classroom chalk board still on the wall.



Jessica doesn't claim to be particularly artistic but she does take great pride in the images that she is able create for her customers. She renders each new tattoo design through graphic editing software to create a stencil which she then shades free hand to create intended effects.

Personal experience with infection as a teenager after getting her very first tattoo taught Jessica to prioritize hygiene as much as artistic expression. She is now fully certified with a variety

of testing related to hygiene practices and procedures. The studio has also been formally inspected and certified to meet all state regulations for health and hygiene.

Originally a career welder, then self-taught mechanic and used car dealer, Jessica is accustomed to hard work and small business ownership. Converting the old classroom into a tattoo studio was actually even less difficult than she expected. Her goal now is to continue decorating and embellishing the space - limited only by a higher-than-anticipated demand for appointments. And then maybe to pass her most recent trade on to her son.

HEDGE

"As autumn approaches, hedge apples make their presence known. But what exactly is the purpose of these intriguing fruits? Contrary to the belief that they repel all spiders or roaches, hedge apples have a different historical role. Hedge apples are most renowned for their role in creating decorative pieces and the use of their wood for crafting natural boundary fences. Ever seen an old pasture fence that has been there forever? You can bet those posts are hedge.

Familiarly known as horse apples, monkey balls, Bois d'Arc, and Osage orange, these fruits hold a rich array of names.

While they have a rich array of names, the fruit does not taste so rich. They are actually bitter, and most people would consider them unpalatable, but you can eat them. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service, the fleshy fruit is about 80 percent digestible.

Also, be cautious when handling hedge apples, as the milky juice found in the stems and fruit may cause skin irritation.

Under the textured exterior, the flesh appears compact and ranges from creamy white to a soft pale green. Within, you'll find 200 to 300 elongated, light brown seeds. They are the most edible part of the fruit.

A family tried these seeds and documented the experience on YouTube. The children described the seeds as "tasting like pine cones," while the mother informed the audience that it took them an hour to extract seeds from one half of the fruit.

What are some uses of the fruit?


Due to the strength of the trees, the wood was used to build wagon wheel rims, mine support timbers, and other items.

Native Americans prized the tree for its use in making long bows and other war weapons.

The Osage were the primary population in the Mississippi Basin and used the wood to make bows. The tribe was famous for making and using the Osage Longbow, which was often traded with other tribes.

Although it is now popular to use hedge apples to repel insects and mice, this old wives' tale appears to be folklore. There is no scientific evidence that hedge apples are efficient insect repellents.

Hedge apples will not keep insects away from your home. People assume that the oils from the fruit keep bugs away."
