



#### Clerk's Corner:

Thank you to all that ran! Please don't stop there! There are plenty of committee meetings you can attend and contribute to.

November 27, 2023 will be the last day for lawn bag pick up. Please remember to have your leaves in paper lawn bags with stickers from the City on them. Stickers are \$3 and can be purchased at City Hall.

There has been many questions and accusations regarding funding for projects in the community. One popular comment is why are we spending money on streets when we should be spending it on water. This is a very good question, and we are happy to explain: We have two funds designated for street repairs and expenses, a Road Use Tax Fund and Street Projects Fund. These funds are separate amounts of money as required by the State of Iowa because they have special purposes. The purpose is street maintenance and repair.

The Road Use Tax Fund (RUTF) was created in 1949 by the Iowa legislature to assist state, county, and cities with maintenance of Iowa's road infrastructure. These funds are obtained by the state through a fuel tax rate, that is set by the legislature. These funds are then distributed back to Iowa cities and counties based on population. The state requires that these funds be spent on road maintenance, road wages, road equipment only and the city reports

that go to the IDOT in a Road Use Tax Report. Monthly fun ds are transferred to the RUTF monthly and used for wages and street improvements.

The other fund that we have for streets is funded from Local Option Sales and Service Taxes (LOSST). These funds were elected by the voters of Buffalo in 1985. Voters approved the additional 1% tax to be used 50% for property tax relief, 24% for community development, and 24% for street improvements. Taxpayers pay 7% for items purchased in Scott County, 6% is set aside for the state and 1% comes back to those communities that have a voter approved tax. The LOSST distribution is based on a formula using population and tax levies. Since the voters approved this tax, it must be allocated and spent according.

We hope this explanation is helpful to understand why funds are being spent on streets. We are looking at financing options to assist with the necessary updates for the water utility. Unfortunately, funds from the water utility are derived from water rates and will need to be increased to provide improved water service. We will be working on those numbers and providing information.

#### UPDATE on Well #1

The contractor was scheduled to start on November 9, 2023. They anticipate finishing the repairs in about a week's time frame. Once the repairs are completed, we will test for bacteria, iron, and PFAS. Once all the tests are within the required guidelines, we will transfer to using well #1 and will update everyone with that information and test results.

## **Thanksgiving at Plymouth**



In September 1620, a small ship called the Mayflower left Plymouth, England, carrying 102 passengers—an assortment of religious separatists seeking a new home where they could freely practice their faith and other individuals lured by the promise of prosperity and land ownership in the "New World." After a treacherous and uncomfortable crossing that lasted 66 days, they dropped anchor near the tip of Cape Cod, far north of their intended destination at the mouth of the Hudson River. One month later, the Mayflower crossed Massachusetts Bay, where the Pilorims, as they are now commonly known, began the work of establishing a village at Plymouth. Did you know? Lobster, seal and swans were on the Pilgrims' menu. Throughout that first brutal winter, most of the colonists remained on board the ship, where they suffered from exposure, scurvy and outbreaks of

contagious disease. Only half of the Mayflower's original passengers and crew lived to see their first New England spring. In March, the remaining settlers moved ashore, where they received an astonishing visit from a member of the Abenaki tribe who greeted them in English.

Several days later, he returned with another Native American, Squanto, a member of the Pawtuxet tribe who had been kidnapped by an English sea captain and sold into slavery before escaping to London and returning to his homeland on an exploratory expedition. Squanto taught the Pilgrims, weakened by malnutrition and illness, how to cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, catch fish in the rivers and avoid poisonous plants. He also helped the settlers forge an alliance with the Wampanoag, a local tribe, which endured for more than 50 years and remains one of the sole examples of harmony between European colonists and Native Americans.

### When Was the First Thanksgiving?

In November 1621, after the Pilgrims' first corn harvest proved successful, Governor William Bradford organized a celebratory feast and invited a group of the fledgling colony's Native American allies, including the Wampanoag chief Massasoit. Now remembered as America's "first Thanksgiving"-although the Pilorims themselves may not have used the term at the time—the festival lasted for three days. While no record exists of the first Thanksgiving's exact menu, much of what we know about what happened at the first Thanksgiving comes from Pilgrim chronicler Edward Winslow, who wrote:

Historians have successed that many of the dishes were likely prepared using traditional Native American spices and cooking methods. Because the Pilgrims had no oven and the Mayflower's sugar supply had dwindled by the fall of 1621, the meal did not feature pies, cakes or other desserts, which have become a hallmark of contemporary celebrations.
