

The grass is turning green and the chickens are finally laying again! Do you know what the "bloom" is on an egg? The bloom is the very

last coating that the hen secretes over the exterior of the egg as it is being laid.

This bloom coating is very important because this is what protects and seals the egg from the outside environment.

As long as this coating is intact and not washed off, the resulting egg is safe to store at room temperature for several

weeks! 🧆

Yep, eggs don't have to be refrigerated! They only do if they are washed and the protective bloom coating is destroyed.

Washing eggs is yet another modern process in which the USDA has mandated to "improve safety." However, I view it as just a cover up for mega poultry farms who operate under dirty and crowded

conditions \bigcirc \bigcirc .

Ok, back to the beautiful blooms! Blooms are highly prized for not only their functionality, but their **beauty** as well. The bloom goes on wet and quickly dries into an opaque coating.

Some hens lays thin blooms and others can lay very heavy blooms that give the eggs a chalky appearance.

These bloom coatings can change the appearance of the eggs, too!

- () A heavy bloom on a brown egg can turn it pink.
- () A heavy bloom on a blue egg can turn it purple.
- A heavy bloom on a green egg can turn it grey.

Have you ever eaten eggs that still have a bloom coating?

Each spring, the ruby-throated hummingbird arrives in numbers along the Gulf Coast by early March, filtering northward over the next two months until arriving in

northern states and southern provinces by late April or early May. Migrating males usually arrive a week or so before females at any given location. As conditions warm on the wintering grounds, data indicate that they leave their winter homes earlier on their way to the Gulf Coast. Interestingly, it also appears that hummingbirds then hang around in the Gulf Coast for longer than normal, perhaps to recuperate from their trip across the Gulf of Mexico

"Forget the daffodils, Carolyn! The road is invisible in these clouds and fog, and there is nothing in the world except you and these children that I want to see badly enough to drive another inch!"

My daughter smiled calmly and said, "We drive in this all the time, Mother." "Well, you won't get me back on the road until it clears, and

then I'm heading for home!" I assured her. "I was hoping you'd take me over to the garage to pick up my car." "How far will we have to drive?" "Oh...just a few blocks," Carolyn said. "But I'll drive. I'm used to this."

After several minutes, I had to ask, "Where are we going? This isn't the way to the garage!"

"We're going to my garage the long way," Carolyn smiled, "by way of the daffodils."

"Carolyn," I said sternly, "please turn around."

"It's all right, Mother, I promise. You will never forgive yourself if you miss this experience." After about twenty minutes, we turned onto a small gravel road and I saw a small church. On the far side of the church, I saw a hand-lettered sign with an arrow that read, "Daffodil Garden" We got out of

the car, each took a child's hand, and I followed Carolyn down the path. Then, as we turned a corner, I looked up and gasped. Before me lay the most glorious sight. It looked as though someone had taken a great vat of gold and poured it over the mountain peak and its surrounding slopes. The flowers were planted in majestic, swirling patterns, great ribbons and swaths of deep orange, creamy white, lemon yellow, salmon pink, and saffron and butter yellow. Each different-colored variety was planted in large groups so that it swirled and flowed like its own river with its own unique hue. There were five acres of flowers.

"Who did this?" I asked Carolyn.

"Just one woman," Carolyn answered. "She lives on the property. That's her home."

Carolyn pointed to a well-kept A-frame house, small and modestly sitting in the midst of all that glory. We walked up to the house. On the patio, we saw a poster. "Answers to the Questions I Know You Are Asking" was the headline. The first answer was a simple one. "50,000 bulbs," it read. The second answer was, "One at a time, by one woman. Two hands, two feet, and one brain." The third answer was, "Began in 1958."


For me, that moment was a life-changing experience. When we multiply tiny pieces of time with small elements of daily effort, we too will find we can accomplish magnificent things. We can change the world.

"It makes me sad in a way," I admitted to Carolyn. "What might I have accomplished if I had thought of a wonderful goal thirty-five or forty years ago and had worked away at it 'one bulb at a time' through all those years? Just think what I might have been able to achieve!"

My daughter summed up the message of the day in her usual direct way. "Start tomorrow," she said.

She was right. It's so pointless to think of the lost hours of yesterdays. The way to make learning a lesson of celebration instead of a cause for regret is to only ask, "How can I put this to use today?" Enjoy your day!

Bags, vests and pinchers will be provided. Rakes are welcome!

City Wide Clean-Up will be April 13-24. You may take your junk items to the landfill for free with proof of residency. No construction items will be allowed. A list of names and addresses will be at the gate for those living in Buffalo with Blue Grass addresses. City Hall will be closed on Friday, March 29, 2024 to observe Good Friday.

Anyone living in Buffalo must register their pet at City Hall. Licenses are \$5 or \$1 for senior citizens and must have a current rabbi vaccination record.

Well update:

We received the test results for well #1. The number for PFOA is 4.3, and the DNR has been notified. Well #1 has also been tested for bacteria, as required, which the test results are negative. We believe that the PFAS amounts will fluctuate with the use of well

#1 and we will continue to test quarterly, per our DNR Water Supply Operation Permit and submit our results. We will be bringing well #1 online today, March 7, 2024, but it will take a couple of days for well #2 water to get out of the system. We will be opening a couple of dead-end fire hydrants to help flush out the system.

The health and public safety of the residents of Buffalo is the first priority of the mayor, council members and staff of the City of Buffalo. We thank you for your patience during the repair of well #1.
