Forener McCortney, of Scott county field an inquest on the remains of Godiness yesterday afternoon. The cooner ordered a postmortem, and it was performed by the Buffalo physicism who had been called in the morning after Goodness' dead body was discovered in his bed, Dr. McCortney assisting. They found that the blow on the right side of the head had rup; tured a blood vessel between the brain and the skull, and that a blood clot had formed there that weighed over half a pound. The pressure of this clot upon the brain was the plain cause of death. The hearing ended with the return by the jury of a verdict that found that Goodness came to his death from the effects of ablow upon the head by an oar held by Jacob Injounts.

After the inquest the boys were taken before the mayor, their bond was fixed at \$800 apiece, and their hearing was set for next Monday. They were to be lodged in the county juil at Davenport today, being unable to furnish the bond required.

All McGnirk and Scott & Theophilus, of Davenport, will defend the boys. Mr. Scott gives the defense's version of the affair. He states that Goodness was full of badness on the listand, and three times was pulled off by 'ves Mounts by other members of the party, which numbered from a dozen to twenty men. He states that Goodness went back to town about the cook and continued to drink bad whisty there, and maile frequent threats of, what he was going to do to the Mounts boys when he got a charge at them. He says that Goodness wat they landed in the ovening, accompanied by Clint. Powell Coodness made for the Mounts boys with the evident intention of

MOTHER'S COOKBOOK HOSTESS CARAMELS



2 C. sugar 1 1/2 Tbl. Vanilla 1/2 lb. butter 1 C ch nuts 1 3/4 C. corn syrup 1 can (14 1/2 oz.) evap milk Place all ingredients except vanilla and nuts in saucepan and cook over high

heat for about 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. If using a candy thermometer, cook over high heat until thermometer registers 210 degrees F. Reduce heat to a medium setting and continues cooking, stirring constantly until 244 degrees or the firm-ball stage is reached.

Remove from heat add vanilla,nuts. Stir quickly and pour into greased pan. Cool, turn out and cut in squares and wrap in wax paper. For chocolate

caramels add 3 squares sweetened chocolate to mixture at start of recipe Jan Heilmann





Next Council Meeting April 14, 2025 @ 6:00 pm City Wide Cleanup starts April 5, 2025 thru April 12, 2025. You may take your junk to the landfill for free. Please have proof of your address. This is a great time to get those yards cleaned up!

Cemetery Cleanup starts March 15, 2025 thru March 22, 2025. Please make sure ALL your items are off the graves BEFORE April 15th. Please make sure you move your shepherd's hooks close to the headstone so the crew can mow around them. The Ordinance states there is to be no items in the ground around the headstone, so please place them as close to the headstone as possible. All items are removed to start fresh. If you just put something out there, please get it taken down before April 15th. The crew does not have time to pick through all the items on the headstones. We appreciate your cooperation.

Park Board Meeting April 9, 2025 @ 6:00 pm Park Clean up April 12, 2025 @9 until finished. Please come out and help clean up the parks to start the new season!

Spring is approaching so that means grass will be growing. Please remember, starting April 1st, if your grass gets longer that 10 inches, the city will automatically mow your grass. Charges will be \$175 for the first offense and \$350 for each offense afterwards.

You could have kid mow your grass for far less, so please make sure we keep on this!

The city will also be working on getting people to clean their yards. This is the nuisance ordinance:
3-1.0101 Definitions. For use in this chapter, the following

terns are defined: 1. "NUISANCE" shall mean whatever poses an unreasonable threat to health or safety; interferes with the comfortable enjoyment of life or property in an unreasonable manner; or causes annoyance or distress to a reasonable person of normal sensitivities. In addition to the above definition and to nuisances as designated by other provisions of the Buffalo City Code and state law, the following are declared to be nuisances: R. The storage, placing, keeping, or leaving of building materials, appliances, furniture, machinery, equipment, scrap metal, or other similar personal property or fixtures outside of a dwelling or accessory building on residential lots so as to impair the residential character and/or property value of the surrounding lots or neighborhood. This definition shall not apply to boats, camping trailers, or similar recreational vehicles which are not otherwise junk vehicles under Chapter 3; nor shall it apply to building materials, machinery, and equipment on a residential lot when, and only when, an active and valid building permit has been issued for that residential lot. If you think it's valuable, then store it somewhere that people can not see it or touch it.
